# Weekend Update: Art at Bainbridge, Informed by the Work of Princeton's Toni Morrison

**Princeton, NJ** –The papers of renowned novelist and former Princeton University professor Toni Morrison, some of which are now <u>on view at the Princeton University Library</u>, have also sparked some artistic collaboration.

The Cycle of Creativity: Alison Saar and the Toni Morrison Papers, opdening Saturday, February 25, from 1 to 4 p.m. at Bainbridge House at 158 Nassau Street, "brings sculpture, prints, and textiles by the mixed-media artist Alison Saar into conversation with the work of Toni Morrison," according to the press release from the Princeton University Art Museum, sponsor of the exhibit. "Saar and Morrison share a dedication to giving voice to the Black American experience, drawing inspiration from past generations and creating space for future cultural production through a dynamic that Saar calls a 'cycle of creativity.' The exhibition explores themes that resonate in the

works of both Saar and Morrison—musicality, labor, and ancestors—through various facets of each artist's practice."

Exhibition curator Mitra Abbaspour will lead the celebration during the February 25 open house.

The 12-page exhibition brochure, <u>available by clicking here</u>, presents some of the connections between Morrison and Saar.

"Born in 1931 in Loraine, Ohio, Morrison, who died in 2019, is best known for her novels but also wrote poems, lyrics, and many essays as part of her lifelong exploration of the power of language.

"Saar, born in 1956 into a family of artists in Los Angeles, had early exposure to diverse artistic mediums as well as the capacity of artworks to embody cultural values. This foundation emerges in her work, which includes sculptures cast in bronze or assembled from found wood and metal, paintings, and prints on paper or textiles.

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"Saar shares Morrison's dedication to giving voice to the African American experience, particularly the lives of Black women, drawing inspiration from past generations to create space for future cultural production through a dynamic that represents a cycle of creativity."

The art will be on view through July 9.
